(PSALM 18:46)

v. 1-6 David's danger.

v. 7-19 The Lord's deliverance.

v. 20-29 David's and the Lord's character.

v. 30-45 David's victory.

v. 46-50 The Lord's greater deliverance.

AT A GLANCE

AUTHOR This psalm has the second longest superscription in the Psalms. David wrote this psalm when he was delivered from Saul.


DIG DEEPER For more about God's throne and the cherubim (v.10) — see Ezekiel 1 and Exodus 19:16FF.

CHRIST IS HERE

The entire psalm points to Christ's victory over sin, death and the devil and to the church's victory in Him. The final verse makes this clear as it ends with the promise of David's "seed" ("offspring" in the ESV).



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The psalm is David's celebration of how God cares for His King and Anointed One. The Lord rescued David from the hand of Saul and all his enemies and raised him up to be king over God's people. David had cried out to the Lord for deliverance, and now that he had been delivered, he was praising the Lord for that rescue. The Lord was David's rock, strength and deliverer. David had confidence that, no matter how dire the situation, the Lord was on his side. Our Lord is still crushing our demonic foes. He is still delivering us from our enemies. In Christ we receive all the blessings of His triumph over evil. As we pray this psalm, we are reminded of how the Lord rescued David, how He rescued our Lord Jesus Christ, and how He will rescue His church. By faith, we have these promises and this deliverance right now. David could pray this way because he trusted the Lord's promise concerning the Messiah that would come from his line and reign forever. We, like David, can build our lives of faith on the Rock of Christ and His Word (see **MATT. 7:24**). And we, like David, await the full victory that will come with the Advent of our King.



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
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PSALM PRAYER
