## Rogate Sunday

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Today is **ROGATE SUNDAY**. Traditionally, this day is set aside as one on which Christians give special thanks and praise to God for the bountiful blessings of the field.

The word *rogation*, comes from the Latin *rogare*, meaning “to ask” or “to pray.” The three days preceding Ascension Day have been known in the Church as Rogation Days, that is, days of prayer, for more than 1,500 years. They began in the fifth century in France, when there had been crop failures due to earthquakes and bad weather, with resulting famine. St. Mamertus, bishop of Vienne, introduced the custom of pastor and people making penitential processions, calling upon God to help, and asking His intervention.

Other communities took up the custom, and St. Gregory the Great later regulated the practice. Since then, it has been the custom to hold, each year before Ascension Day, a special Rogation Service.

The purpose of Rogation Day is to implore the mercy of God that He may keep us from all evils of body and soul, and give to the plants of the field an increase.
